


What's Pointillism?

A painting style that involves applying small strokes or dots of contrasting pigment so that from a distance the dots blend together into solid forms.




The Movement...

- Pointillism began in France in 1886, and continued till 1906.
- The movement that incorporated the Pointillism style was known as "Neo-Impressionism"
- The separation of color through individual touches came be known as Divisionism while the application and process of putting the touches or dots down is referred to as Pointillism.

Why dots?

- Artists involved with the movement enjoyed the spontaneity of Impressionism but favored a painting technique that was founded on science and the study of optics.
- Neo-Impressionists believed that separate touches of pigments resulted in a greater vibrancy of color to the human eye.

Impressed?


- This style of painting is easy to do, but very hard to make it work.






