

'Tiara' series

This month we look at a mini-series of cultivars that originated from the species, *h. nakaiana*.






The 'Tiara' series of cultivars share a distinctive leaf shape and habit that is quite easy to recognise...

H. 'Golden Tiara'

The series begins with *h.* 'Golden Tiara', a hybrid of *h. nakaiana*.

H. 'Golden Tiara'

Registered by Savory in 1977, this medium-sized hosta grows slightly beyond the registered dimensions, forming a lovely open clump of delightfully heart-shaped, leaves.



All cultivars in the Tiara series share a similar habit, they only vary slightly in mound size. This makes them excellent planting partners for each other. They also look good planted among blue varieties for contrast.

August is here...

... and not a moment too soon. What a season it has been so far, especially weather-wise. The long cold, dry winter and spring, followed by bakingly high temperatures and continued lack of rainfall has given us many challenges. However, it seems the hostas are coping far better than us.
