A late start...

Although we have had some strange springs in recent years, this was the coldest, and latest, we have known, since turning our hosta hobby into a business. We consoled ourselves that the late spring might mean a prolonged season. However, this certainly hasn't been the case this year. We had a definite summer, which began in June and ended abruptly on Friday 6th September. The quick change to markedly cooler and wetter conditions, convinced the plants that the season was at an end, and the leaves have been giving us an early example of the glorious colour palette of autumn.

Show round-up

The cold spring also lacked bright days, which meant that the hostas emerged and then stopped, unfurled a little, and then stopped. It was as if they were testing the conditions as they went.

This threw our display plans for the **Harrogate Spring Flower Show** out of the window, and we had to quickly put together an educational display instead. We set off for the **Malvern Spring Flower Show** in warm conditions and spent the build-up days basking on the heat of the marquee. Once the show opened, it was a different story and the showground was again lashed by wind and rain for yet another year. We have got used to packing all manner of clothes and waterproofs for this show and usually end up using everything. Unfortunately, the plants had still not fully unfurled - but they still looked lovely and vibrant.

Plant Heritage held a **'Festival of Plants'** at the Cambridge Botanical Gardens in mid May. Although the event had a good turn out, the last thing visitors were thinking of was gardening in such awful conditions. The Plant Heritage event, at **Helmingham Hall**, which happened at the end of May, was also disappointing this year probably due to the same reasons.

The Royal Norfolk Show was delightful, especially the opportunity to get to see the behind the scenes preparation for a large agricultural show. This is something we haven't been able to do since we were children and it was great. The show was good and we had a lot of interest from visitors keen to come to the nursery, which was our main reason for attending.

This year at **Hampton Court** we staged a large display consisting of several elements - details of which can be found in the **July** and **August** newsletters. After the prolonged cold, it was certainly too hot to think straight at Hampton Court and we were totally in awe of the two guys who routinely donned their rubber and plastic flower pots to circulate among the crowds - see opposite.

Tatton Park Flower Show followed and was very enjoyable. Mel built her favourite display of the year but forgot to take her camera to capture it! The weather was brilliant for the event up until the Sunday when the heavens opened and torrential downpours created new water features in the marquee. This meant we had to carry the entire display out to the lorry, piece by piece - phew!

Our final two shows were at Wisley and Harrogate, at the start of September. **Wisley Flower Show** was a pleasure to exhibit at this year. It was sultry and hot until the Friday and then autumn seemed to arrive overnight. The rain was fat, heavy and cold and effectively called a halt to proceedings.
