



## As autumn approaches...

Our hostas are rapidly developing their autumn colours. This is a delightful time, as the plants can look even more stunning than usual. But it is also a difficult time, if it coincides with the end of the show season...

## A record-breaking season

This year has seen a series of highlights for us, not least of all two RHS Gold Medals. We will share the highlights with you in the October newsletter, when we expect the plants will have dictated an earlier than usual end to the year. This is the direct result of a very early spring, possibly the warmest we have experienced since turning our hosta collection into a business.

Initially, the early warm weather meant that plants we selected to bring forward for our early shows could be used alongside those which emerged without any intervention. We had a wealth of plants to choose from for our Harrogate Spring floral display but the advanced season has meant the opposite for our Harrogate Autumn display. Indeed, we reluctantly decided to cancel our attendance at the autumn show because we felt the plants were heading toward dormancy too quickly to be able to display at their best.

We are still attending the **Wisley Flower Show**, because the plants still look fabulous for a non-judged, outside display. However, they would not withstand the close scrutiny of floral exhibit judging. Nor would they stand up to being exhibited in the floral hall at Harrogate for the duration of the show, which would accelerate their seasonal changes. Although, educationally this would be a brilliant thing to show in the context of a Plant Heritage display, where we can explain what is happening to the plants, it isn't acceptable for a Floral Hall/Marquee exhibit. This is the first time we have pulled out of a show, and it was a hard decision to make in light of how we enjoy the Harrogate shows. However, 2012 is another year, and we hope to be back in the Spring. In the meantime we wish all the best to Martin, and his North of England Horticultural Society team, for their Harrogate Autumn show.

## The 'Edger' series

As previewed last month, we are featuring varieties of hosta sported from *h.* 'Gold Edger' in this issue.

*H.* 'Gold Edger', was registered in 1978 as a sport of *h.* 'Blue Cadet'.

It is a small, gold leaved cultivar with a neat habit, turning from gold to lime green in heavier shade. Its parentage shows in the beautifully proportioned leaf shape.

Most of the sports produced by *h.* 'Gold Edger' show its characteristic leaf shape. The latest sports exhibit a wide range of variegations in colour.

Some of these do appear to be duplicates of each other and we comment on this in the following list of cultivars held in our collection:

So far the only sport of h. 'Gold Edger' to deviate from the leaf shape and pattern is **h. 'X-ray'**, registered in 2000.

The newest cultivar in the series, h. 'Dinky Donna' is a particularly pretty cultivar, low-growing and producing leaves in a rosette pattern. H. 'Pamela Lee' is proving difficult to grow whilst maintaining the dark colouring. The plant tends to revert to it's parent, rather than to a plain colour, and we only have a couple of examples of the cultivar showing the correct pattern and depth of colouring. We displayed these cultivars in our Plant Heritage exhibit at Hampton Court to illustrate how apparent duplication can occur in branches of the genus but also how characteristics can be enhanced through successive generations. Visitors to the display were particularly taken with h. 'Dinky Donna', and were interested to see its origins.
